On the Cover: The resilient Amache Rose's propagated plant cuttings bloomed for the first time at the Denver Botanic Gardens Thursday. The blooming time was serendipitous because it coincided with the official designation of the Amache Internment Camp as a National Historic Site. The Amache Rose varietal was developed by a prisoner at the internment camp 80 years ago as a way to bring beauty and a sense of normalcy to the harsh environment. For some, the flower's survival in the desert lends it a spiritual meaning. The rose's survival after the camp's closure represents the enduring spirit of those who lived through the injustices of internment. This is about human and plant connection. Knowing what the Amache Internment Camp was stirs up the emotions of the terrible ways humans treat each other. We see these repeating patterns all over the world of humans intolerant of other humans for all kinds of made-up reasons."



PRAYER OF CONFESSION

- One: Dear Creator God, You who know how many stars are in the sky, you who feel when a sparrow falls to the ground, and who knows each of your children by name.
- All: With grateful hearts, we thank you and honor our siblings, the Indigenous First Peoples, for their care and stewardship of this land. In our world today, eighty percent of global biodiversity is on land managed by Indigenous people, evidence of their love, contributions, and wisdom. (silence).
- One: God, your heart must break when you see how your children treat each other. Give us the courage and humility to see the truth of our history and the deep wounds of injustice created by our ancestors that continue to scar our hearts and our lands.
- One: We acknowledge that the land where we live and worship today is the territory of the Arapaho, Cheyenne, Ute, and many other Native tribes. We honor Chief Left Hand, leader of the last Arapaho band to spend their winters in the Boulder Valley. We remember the many Arapaho and Cheyenne people brutally massacred by the Boulder-trained US Cavalry at Sand Creek, Colorado, in 1864, the same year First Congregational United Church of Christ was founded. The survivors were forced out of Colorado to reservations in Wyoming and Oklahoma, where most Arapaho live today.
- One: We acknowledge the truth that these Native peoples were violently killed and barbarically uprooted by our ancestors and continue to be marginalized through European settler colonialism. We live in luxury now because of this displacement.
- All: With sorrowful souls, we take a moment now to deeply feel the devastating and senseless loss of millions of Indigenous human beings. (silence)
- One: We also grieve the loss of the Colorado that could have been. We grieve the loss of leadership and wisdom with the murder of chiefs at Sand Creek who were advocating for peace.
- One: We grieve that instead of connection and community and hospitality, the originators of this town left us a legacy of theft and violence and inter-generational trauma.
- All: We grieve the loss of cultural richness--the songs and dances and art, the food, the language and words and names for this land that we do not know. (silence)
- One: God, hear us as we pray:
- All: With the guidance of your unconditional love, we confess that we are living on stolen land, and we need to reconcile with our Native siblings. Please help us, God, to work toward creating authentic relationships and partnerships that recognize and build upon the continuing sovereignty of the Native peoples whose land we now occupy. God, you know what is in our hearts. Please guide us in actively committing to partnering with our Native siblings to learn how to lovingly care for this land together and live in harmony with all our kin. In Jesus' name we pray, Amen.
